REPORTED SPEECH

Tense changes

- "I want to leave for Saigon right now" Paco said he wanted to leave for Saigon right then.
- "I'm going travelling around the world" He said he was going travelling around the world.
- "I haven't seen the film" She said she hadn't seen the film.
- "I have been working for more than fourteen hours" She said she had been working for more than fourteen hours.
- "I was studying all week" She said she had been studying all week.
- "He **went** on holiday to Africa" He said he **had gone** on holiday to Africa.

Sentences that are already in the Past Perfect and Past Perfect Continuous forms remain the same:

- "I hadn't seen him before" She said she hadn't seen him before.
- "I had been waiting for a long time when you arrived" He said he had been waiting for a long time when I arrived".

Reporting modal verbs

Modal verbs also go back one tense.

- Will becomes would.
- "I will see my friend later" She said she would see his friend later.
- Can becomes could.
- "I can speak English far better now" Paco said he could speak far better then.
- May becomes might.
- "It **may** become colder over night" He said it **might** become colder over night.

Direct speech using would, could, might and should all stay the same in reported speech.

"You **should** stop drinking fizzy soft drinks" – He said I **should** stop drinking fizzy soft drinks.

Other changes

Time expressions also change in reported speech.

today - that day
tomorrow - the day after / the next day
yesterday - the day before / the previous day
now - then
next week/month/year - the week/month/year after / the following
week/month/year
last week - the week before / the previous week
ago - before

Other expressions that change:

here – there this – that these – those
